Despite this, I encourage our MSMEs to evolve with the times and maximize the opportunities that have been brought on with this 'new normal', i.e., a digitized global economic landscape. We must retool and equip ourselves in order to master the dynamics of the space in which we now operate.

I commend those business operators who found creative ways of keeping their doors open during the COVID-19 lockdown period. Your resolve and grit have helped the economy to stay adrift.

I urge all Jamaicans to help our country to grow by supporting our small businesses and our small farmers by buying local. It is an investment in ourselves and ensures that the wealth of Jamaica is circulated among its people.
